Nathan's Notes for Sunday, February 4th

Ave Verum k. 618 is among the last pieces Mozart composed. It was finished just weeks before Mozart was commissioned to compose the Requiem k.626, and shows off Mozart's incredible skill and sensitivity when setting text to music. This text is normally sung or spoken during the Catholic mass, when the bread is raised and blessed. This text has been set by several composers, most notably by **Edward Elgar and William** Byrd.
